

# A simple horizontal scarf

**Finished Measurements:** Depends on how many stitches you cast on.

**Materials:**

- 1 Ball each of Knitpicks Wool of the Andes in Tan, Evergreen, Mist and Chocolate. (100% Peruvian Wool, Approx. 110 yds per 50 g ball).

- Size US 7 circular needle in 49" or longer.  
- Notions: Darning needle, scissors

**Directions:**

Evergreen: Using backward loop, cast on 250 (or more) stitches. Knit until there are 3 garter ridges on each side. Cut yarn.

Join tan. Knit until there are 2 full garter ridges of color (do not include the first row, where the ridge is split with the Evergreen color) on each side. Cut yarn.

Join mist. Knit until there are 2 full garter ridges of color (again, not counting where the ridge is split with the previous color) on each side. Cut yarn.

Join Chocolate. Knit until there are 4 full garter ridges of color on each side. Cut yarn.

Join Evergreen. Knit until there is 1 full garter ridge of color on the side with the 1/2 ridge of color mixed with the chocolate and 2 full ridges of color on the other side. Cut yarn.

Join Chocolate, with the side with 2 full ridges of Evergreen facing you. Knit until there are 4 full garter ridges of chocolate on each side. Cut yarn.

Join Mist. Knit until there are 2 full garter ridges of color (again, not counting where the ridge is split with the previous color) on each side. Cut yarn.

Join tan. Knit until there are 2 full garter ridges of color (do not include the first row, where the ridge is split with the mist color) on each side. Cut yarn.

Join Evergreen color. Knit until there are 2 full colored garter ridges on each side. Bind off.

Cut and tie fringe, using the same colors as extensions of the stripes.



**Worth Noting:**

A garter ridge equals 2 garter rows, or 2 rows of knitting.

The colors mirror each other with the center stripe of evergreen being the mirroring line.

With the exception of the central stripe of evergreen, each rogue garter row (the one that mixes with the color before/after it instead of being a solid ridge) alternates to the opposite side it started on. You'll understand this as you knit it.

The "rogue" garter row (the one mixed with another color) will happen on the side that's facing away from you as you're knitting. So in keeping with pattern (except for the central evergreen stripe), you should have a "rogue" row facing you as you start a new color—and the new "rogue" row will be on the opposite side.
